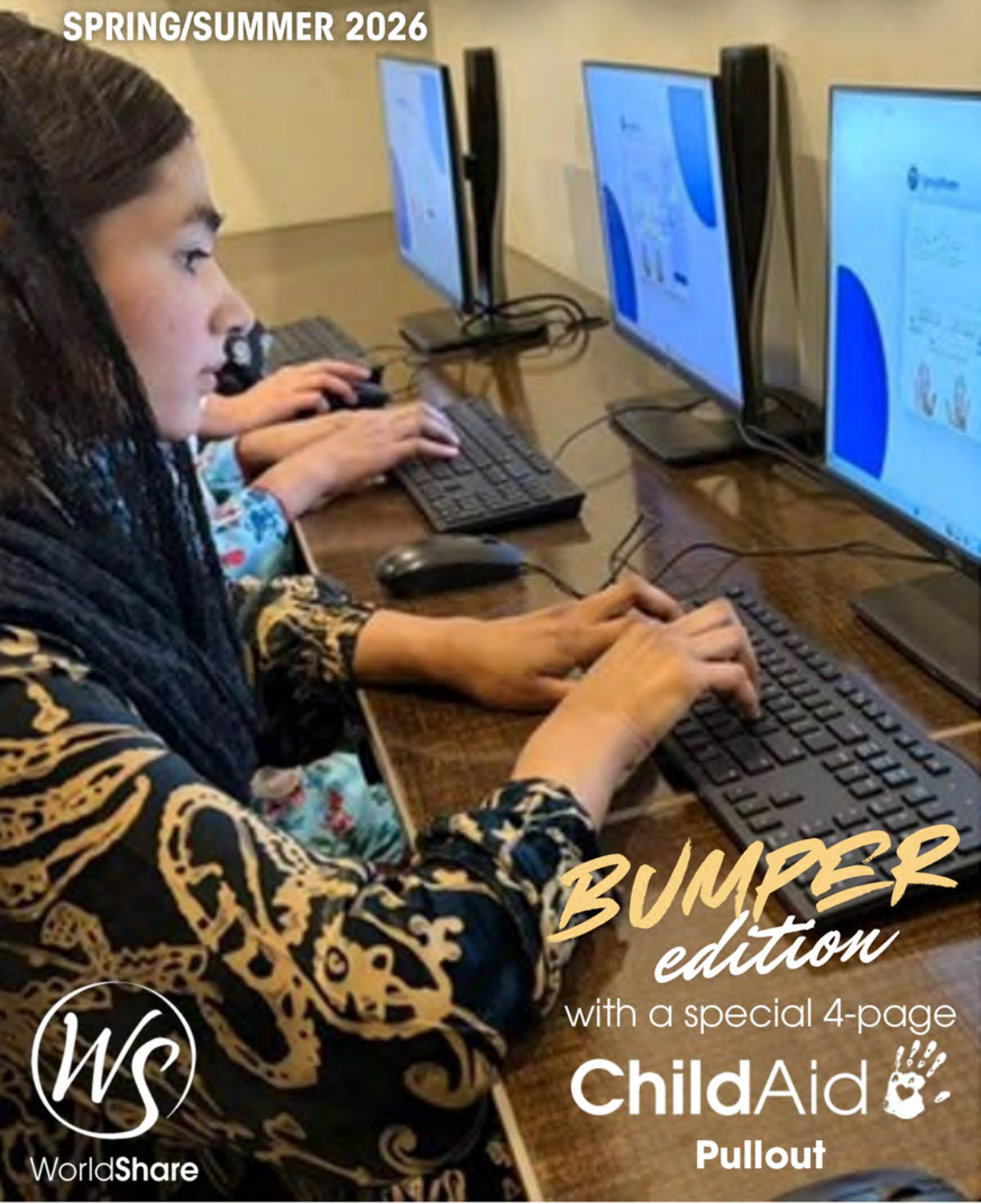

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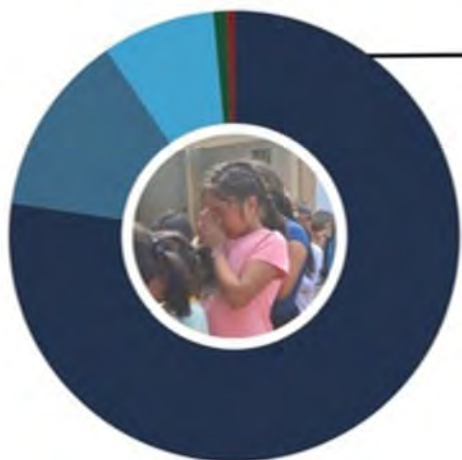
To help WorldShare to continue to provide relief to those in the greatest need, we need your support, both financially and in prayer. To donate to our ongoing work, scan the QR

In 2025, thanks to faithful supporters like you, we saw **income of £571,076**. Of this, almost 77% was from individual donors, with a further 8.1% relating to Gift Aid on those amounts. Just over 13% of income was from trusts and foundations and 1.4% of income was from our alliance partners. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we were able to **issue grants of £291,559**, helping to support our ministry partners' projects around the world.

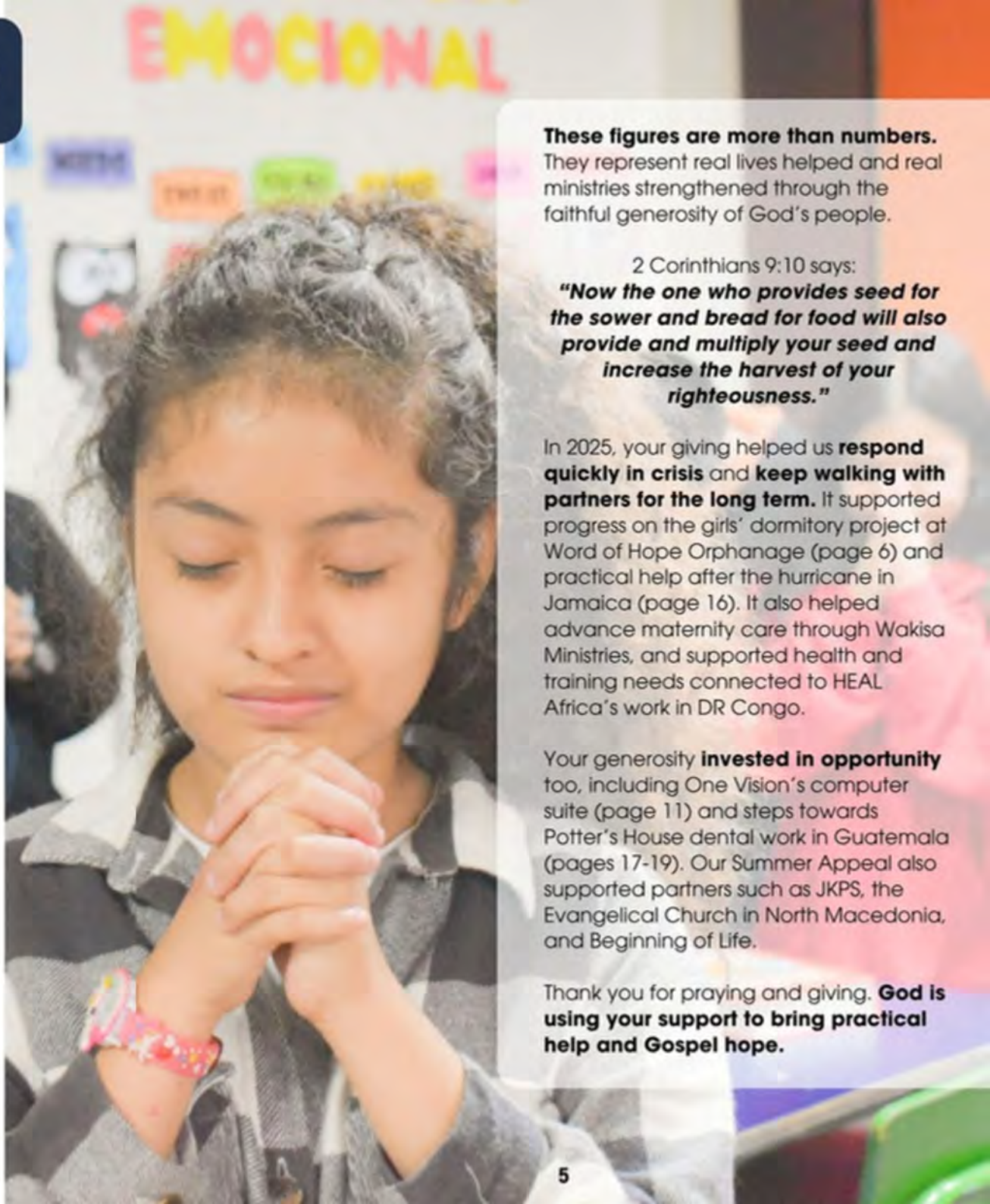
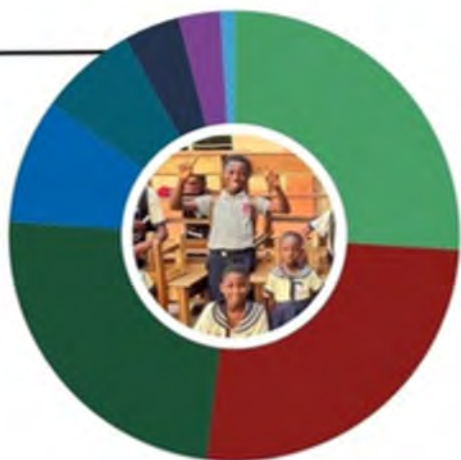

Girls' Dormitory Update

Word of Hope, Myanmar

Praise God that work has finally begun on Word of Hope's dormitory building project in Myanmar. Over a year ago, at the end of January 2025, we launched our appeal for a new girls' dormitory at Hope Orphanage. In May, we held a 10km sponsored walk at Rutland Water, raising funds that were matched, not only once, but twice. We remain humbled by the way in which God continues to provide through you, our supporters. Thank you.

Although the earthquake in Myanmar last March (2025) did not affect Hope Orphanage, the aftermath caused a big rise in demand for building materials, increasing costs by 500%. This understandably delayed the project's start. Despite these setbacks, Pastor Pau and his team continue to trust that "God works all things together for the good of those who love Him" (Romans 8:28).

Demolition of the old dormitory took place in March, and work has begun on the foundations for the new three-storey girls' dormitory. WorldShare has provided an initial grant to begin the building project and will make further grants as the construction progresses. Please continue to pray for Pastor Pau and his team, and for the timely completion of this new dormitory.

New Partner: Growing Deep Roots

Mustard Seed Ministries, South Asia

Mustard Seed Ministries (name changed for security) is our new partner in South Asia, serving churches and young people through Scripture engagement and discipleship. In a context where sharing the Good News publicly requires wisdom and care, we are using a pseudonym for the ministry and for the ministry leader, "Carey", so that their work can continue safely.

Carey has carried a desire from a young age to serve God among his people, especially where biblical understanding has been weak and there have been few workers among young people. After graduating from college and working in a private company, Carey sensed a clear call to give himself fully to ministry.

Today, Mustard Seed Ministries invests in regular Bible study and teaching, leadership development, and discipling young people through regional gatherings and a national youth conference. We asked Carey to share how God has led, what the ministry focuses on now, and what they are praying for in the season ahead.

Interview with Carey

Q: When and why did you begin the ministry?

A: From a young age, I had a desire to do ministry and serve God among my people. The understanding of the Word of God was weak among Christians and leaders, and there were not so many people working among the youths. I began teaching and running seminars, travelling to different parts of the country. In 2009, I resigned from my job to serve God fully.





New Partner: Growing Deep Roots Continued...

Q: What is your focus today?

A: My focus today is Scripture engagement. We do regular Bible study and teaching in my church. I also run a Bible school where we bring in leaders from different parts of the

country to be trained. I also do ministry among young people, where we have regional gatherings of youths and an annual national youth conference.

Q: How do you develop and equip leaders at different levels?

A: For young leaders, I meet with them every week for prayer and mentoring. They are made part of the church leadership team and given responsibilities within the church. For the youth, we conduct Bible study every week. For church leaders, we meet every month and teach them. Some of them also go through Bible school. They are given the task to run care groups and nurture them.



Q: What fruit have you seen recently?

A: Gabriel came to church through the witness of a church member. He was moved by the fellowship and the Word of God, and he grew deeper in the Word. He attended most of the church services, especially Bible study. Today, he leads Bible study among youths and also teaches Sunday school. He desires to go to Bible college and serve God full time.

John attended Sunday school and youth regularly, but at college he fell into bad influences and addictions. Because he had grown up in the church, he was convicted of his sins and repented. When he returned, he wanted to attend a good church and approached me. As he attended our church, he started reading the Bible and actively participating. He regularly attended Bible study and lived a transformed life. As we saw his commitment and growth, we gave him the role to lead the youth and to do Bible study with them. Today, he is a youth leader, a worship leader, and occasionally preaches in the home fellowship.

Q: What is it like to follow Jesus where public evangelism is restricted?

A: We can live a Christian life and also profess publicly about our faith, but we

need to be very careful when it comes to sharing the good news. In normal conversations it is okay to share about Jesus, but it is important to know who you are sharing with. Preaching openly and publicly can attract attention and invite local authorities.

Q: What are you hoping God will do through your team over the next 6-12 months?

A: I hope that God will grow us deeper in our relationship with Him and build relationships with one another. We want to be accountable to one another and more intentional about our spiritual growth. We look forward to going deeper in God's Word through Bible study and personal devotions. We also look forward to impacting our society and church members. We pray that more people will hear the Gospel and that a home fellowship will be started.

Q: How can the WorldShare family support you right now?

A: Please pray for us. We also need resources for disciple training for youths, fathers and marriage. Financial support will help our youth ministry and our plan to purchase our own church property.

Ministry Trip: Pakistan

One Vision Society, Pakistan



TACKLING INJUSTICE



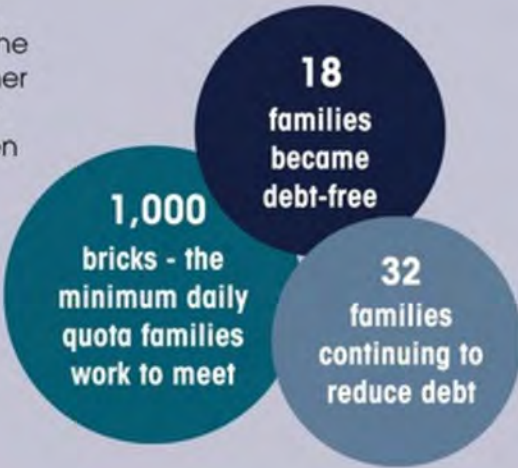

For a number of years WorldShare has supported the work of ChrisFon in Pakistan, ministering among Christian communities working in the brick kilns located on the outskirts of Lahore. Many families are trapped in poverty as they have to pay off loans to kiln owners by working for them. The problem is that the interest on these loans means that it is almost impossible to do so.

As our partnership with ChrisFon neared its conclusion, WorldShare board member, Musarrat Iqbal, who was born in Lahore, and Andrew, visited to see the impact first-hand of their work in helping people escape this form of modern slavery.

Travelling from the city, the air becomes thicker with the smoke generated from the kilns. Entire families are employed together making bricks to meet daily quotas of at least 1,000 bricks each. Children are often involved turning bricks as they dry.

The project helped 18 families become debt-free with a further 32 continuing to reduce their debt. With little other work available however, even those who become debt-free often have to continue working in this trade, albeit with better rates of pay.



Whilst in Lahore, WorldShare visited several potential new ministry partners including *One Vision Society*, led by Pastor Shakeel. Shakeel is a software programmer, who wanted to set up a Christian Computer Centre in his church. The plan was to teach disadvantaged young people from their community the skills needed to enable them to become programmers and so provide for their families. At the same time, each free course would teach students about Jesus and present the Gospel.



WorldShare was so impressed with this project that we provided the funding required to equip and set up the classroom. Due to the One Vision team's diligence, within a matter of weeks, it was ready. Classes for 23 students have already begun each weekday and young lives are being given hope and a future, both practically and spiritually.

Pastor Shakeel said, *"WorldShare's support has made it possible for us to start the first-ever Computer Centre in our area. We are deeply thankful to WorldShare for helping turn this vision into a reality and for investing in the future of our community here."*

We look forward to hearing more good news from this project in the coming months.

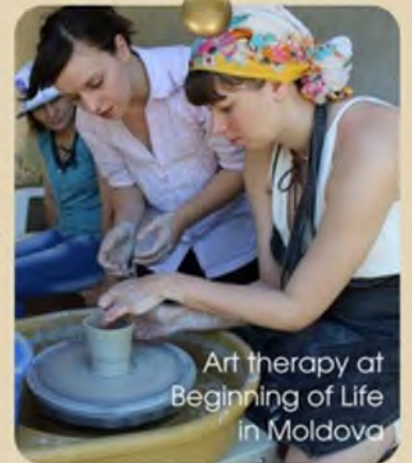

PiFò Haiti

Cultivating sustainability and strength

PiFò Haiti's community garden continues to grow, and so does the team's confidence. Thanks to additional bags of cement secured by the Project Manager, Emerson, the final blocks for the new garden depot were completed, followed by a sturdy roof. This simple depot now provides a secure space for tools, and it also offers a welcome refuge of shade for workers labouring under the Haitian sun.



The garden is also bringing in steady income. Papaya trees, now mature and abundant, are helping to cover daily food for the workers and even pay for extra help at harvest time. It is encouraging to see a project that once felt out of reach beginning to take shape, and the team feels a huge sense of achievement.

Yet challenges remain. Transporting large water tanks from the mainland is still unsafe, and the need for reliable irrigation grows. Volunteer Director, Wendy Thiessen, is planning to visit Haiti in late May. She will explore solar options to power the generator that pumps water from the well (much cheaper than

diesel), and to build partnerships that will help supplies move more safely. Please pray for Wendy's safety, both for travel and for her time in Haiti.



Wakisa Ministries

Two decades of hope, healing and new beginnings

On 5th December last year, Wakisa Ministries celebrated 20 years of love, hope and second chances. From the very first girl they welcomed in 2005 to the thousands who have since passed through their doors, this anniversary was a reminder that each life transformed, each baby safely delivered, and each family restored is a testimony of grace.

In the last issue of WINDOW, we asked you to pray for the finances to enable the installation of electricity and solar panels at the new maternity centre. This, along with the construction of a placenta pit, was critical for the centre to achieve its official licensing.

Praise God that on 27th January, Wakisa Ministries received their licence from the Ministry of Health, which means that the centre can now serve mothers from the community as well as the girls already in their care.



Joyce Mukonyezi is now the Director of Wakisa Ministries, replacing Founder and former Director, Vivian Kityo, who has retired. Vivian is still involved, taking on the less demanding role of Ambassador and Strategic Advisor.



We are very excited to have both Wendy and Vivian joining us at the Keswick Convention (week 1) where we'll be hosting a special Mission Plus event on Wednesday 22nd July. Come along and hear, first hand from them, what God is doing in Uganda and Haiti.



Jamaica Hurricane Response

Hopewell Missionary Church, Jamaica

Hurricane Melissa hit the Hopewell Missionary Church buildings with ferocious winds, removing the roofs of the Sanctuary and the Christian Education Centre. WorldShare gave a grant of £4,000 to assist. Here are Pastor Ronald Webster's (pictured below) own words:

"The Sanctuary roof was an elaborate roof, peaking at more than 40 feet from the floor and previously anchored by light poles used for electricity transmission on the island. The sheer weight of the roof could not be sustained after the winds of the hurricane breached a supporting wall and shook it from its heights to the ground. The roof came crashing down thereafter.

"Our mission remains focused on the lives of the people we are called to serve."

After the removal of all debris from the Sanctuary, the Church turned its attention away from its own needs and focused on the needs of communities nearby, and as far away as Westmoreland, which experienced the most



devastating blow from the hurricane. We provided support by re-roofing houses, distributing care packages, food supplies, tarpaulins, medical supplies and small business re-establishment grants.

With the support of donor funds from agencies such as WorldShare and churches previously served by our Missions teams, the Christian Education Centre was re-roofed at a cost of nearly two million Jamaican dollars (almost £10,000), thereby enabling the facility to become the Worship Centre.

While doing this, our mission remains focused on the lives of the people we are called to serve, providing continued support in reconstruction and welfare, working closely with humanitarian groups such as Operation Mobilisation to be God's hands extended."

Celebrating 40 Years of Hope

Potter's House, Guatemala



2026 marks the 40th anniversary of Potter's House ministry in Guatemala, and 25 years of partnership with WorldShare. CEO Andrew and Operations Manager Clare, who administers our ChildAid programme, were invited to join the current team as they celebrated this milestone.

Potter's House was established in 1986 by Gladys Guitz and Lisbeth Piedrasanta, who gave blankets to children scavenging the city rubbish dump of Guatemala City. It has since grown into a nationwide ministry, with three community centres, holistically serving families in extreme poverty.

The trip began in Guatemala City with a celebratory event, which included worship, led by the Potter's House children's choir, each one of whom is supported through their programme.



The original city community centre was located near to the city dump entrance but was destroyed by fire in 1997. The current facility was built on the same site thanks to the Lord meeting the need. Like all their centres, it provides daily healthy meals to combat malnutrition, space to learn with support from teachers, to counter educational inadequacies and spiritual input to help them grow in their relationship with Jesus.



Celebrating 40 Years of Hope Continued...

A key element of the Potter's House ethos is to allow 'kids to be kids'. Many children do not have the ability to play outside of the programme and often join without having had a toy to learn how to do so. One of Andrew's highlights of the visit to the city community centre was being invited to lead two PE lessons for 9 and 10 year-olds. The children had the opportunity to partake in team games as well as being taught 'rounders', something they loved.



The centre in Chiquimula, which has been operating for nine years, is located in the east of the country. It is a 6-hour bus ride away in what is known as the 'dry corridor', due to the lack of rain and higher temperatures.

Due to God's miraculous provision, this site has grown from a bare patch of land to a thriving centre that serves 70 children and their families. It hosts an agricultural area, where fruit and vegetables are grown to be used in the 'Treasures' lunches. With the help of many volunteer teams from overseas, it continues to grow, with construction currently under way on medical buildings and additional classrooms.



Local families were invited to a special 40th Anniversary celebration event, where they not only heard the Gospel proclaimed, but saw it revealed through the generous gifts of blankets, in a nod to how the ministry originally began.

Newest centre in the Western Highlands grows

A few doors away is the Medical Centre, which provides low cost, high quality medical and dental services to those who would otherwise have no access to such due to lack of finance. People outside the city travel significant distances to benefit from this service, such is its reputation.

The newest centre in Momostenango, located in the Western Highlands is just three years old and is serving 50 children. Originally a house that was donated to establish the centre, it too has seen major development of new facilities, including kitchen, toilets and a newly completed second classroom.



Both Clare and Andrew took part in two of the regular home visits that Potter's House undertakes to support families of children on their programme. These not only provide spiritual and emotional support, but also practical help in the form of food parcels and water filtration systems.

The trip reaffirmed the amazing work that Potter's House continues to undertake. Their staff teams are totally dedicated to bringing transformation in Jesus' name and do so extremely effectively.

New Friends, New Conversations

Evangelical Church in North Macedonia



The Evangelical Church in North Macedonia (ECNM) has seen a start to the year that has been filled with joy, outreach and new opportunities to share God's love.

In Skopje, Resen and Negotino, *Night to Shine* events welcomed more than 700 people with disabilities to a celebration of dignity and hope. Pastor Dragan from Resen wrote:

"After the event, many in our small town spoke very highly about us (as organisers) and shared their excitement about *Night to Shine*."



Some of the parents have started attending church services. Please pray for the local churches as they continue to build on these relationships through workshops and follow-up projects.

In Ohrid, a new art club has become a simple but meaningful space for fellowship and testimony, drawing both adults and children into deeper community. Similar creativity is flourishing in Radovich, where art workshops have opened doors to connect with new families, including children with disabilities. Alongside this, personal conversations are helping people ask questions about faith.

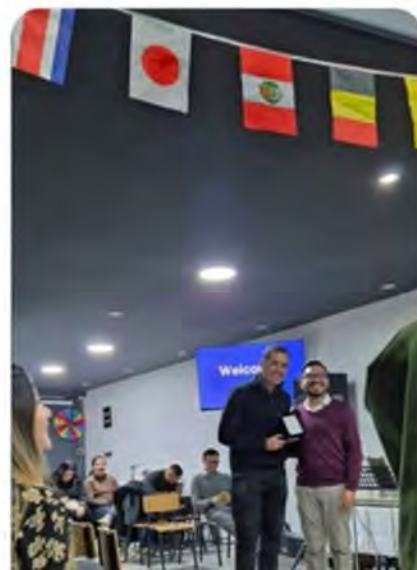


Several churches have launched Alpha Courses, with strong attendance from people new to Christianity. Pastor Zhivko from Aerodrom is working on translating all the video and written materials for the Alpha Course, including Alpha for Youth, workbooks and guidelines. These resources will be a great blessing to the churches.

In Kavadarci, the church continues to faithfully invest in the Roma community, especially the children. Pastor Dime organised a puppet show with a Christian message for the Roma children, which involved young people from Kavadarci and Prilep. Afterwards, the children were invited to attend a course called *The Greatest Journey*. Many of these children are from Muslim backgrounds.



Finally, in Kumanovo, the new AGAPE Cultural Centre was officially opened, a key addition to ECNM's humanitarian work among Muslims. The centre will serve as a beautiful bridge between Macedonians and Albanians, fostering fellowship, sharing the Gospel, building relationships, and demonstrating the unifying love of Christ in a divided context.



A Chance to Learn

Living Word of Faith, Ghana

Three years ago, WorldShare first visited High Priest Academy (HPA) in Accra, Ghana, a school run by Living Word of Faith Ministries as a service to the local community. As you read in our last issue of WINDOW, that visit led to support through our 10:10 Partners programme and, more recently, HPA becoming part of our ChildAid sponsorship work.

What struck Andrew most during his trip in April this year was how hard the school is fighting to keep its doors open for children who would otherwise be left behind. Costs have continued to rise, and the pressure on families is intense. Head teacher John Adu shared that around 60% of pupils are currently non-fee paying. Many of the families who do pay are also in arrears, some for nearly 12 months, because of the financial strain they face.



Yet Pastor Samuel (Sam) Amponsah is determined that the church will do all it can to show the hope of the Gospel by keeping children in class and off the streets.



"Therefore, whenever we have the opportunity, we should do good to everyone—especially to those in the family of faith." Galatians 6:10



Children like James*, a 14-year-old who had been seen as a "lost cause", was brought to the city by his family and later found wandering the streets. His mother thought he was beyond help. Pastor Sam offered James the opportunity to attend school for free, rather than be drawn into drug-taking and street crime. Since being given that chance, James is thriving in class and cannot wait to be there each day.



Stories like James's are only possible because of sacrificial commitment from the team. John Adu's wife and three children live outside Accra, where rent is cheaper. John sees them only once every six weeks or so, or on special occasions. HPA is also unable to pay John reliably, so he takes short-term contract work to support his family. He does it because he believes in the school's mission: to give children who would otherwise have no hope or future the chance to learn, and to hear about Jesus.

This is a school that is currently surviving rather than thriving. As John Adu explained,

"High Priest Academy would have closed a long time ago without WorldShare's help. This school has a future, but we are facing difficult times. Potential fee-paying parents hear about our 100% pass rate but are put off from sending their children here due to our overcrowded classrooms."



Yet despite this reality, every child Andrew spoke to was thrilled to be in school and receiving an education that would otherwise not be available to them.

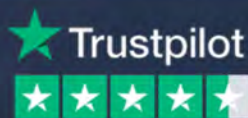

ChildAid sponsorship helps children flourish through education, care and discipleship. This pull-out gives you a glimpse of the children and families being supported through our partners, along with simple ways to pray and respond. JKPS: Rooted and Growing

At the start of 2026, young people in the JKPS sponsorship programme gathered for a three-day youth camp built around the theme 'Rooted and Growing' in Christ. Through worship, prayer and focused teaching, many chose to live out their faith with greater intentionality.

Later that month, 80 children took part in Sports Day. It was a joyful day, but what many remembered most was the shared lunch, a simple moment of celebration and belonging.

Ghana spotlight: High Priest Academy

High Priest Academy is serving 172 students in Accra, including many children whose families cannot afford school fees. The church is choosing to keep children in class and off the streets, even when it comes at real cost.

ChildAid sponsorship does more than help one child. It helps sustain the school itself, so it can keep serving the poorest in the community in Jesus' name. Sponsorship helps provide stability, enabling learning, care and discipleship to continue for children who would otherwise be left behind.



The quarter ended with a Parents Meeting, where families received updates on the new curriculum, attendance expectations and upcoming exams. Parents asked questions, shared concerns and left knowing what their children are working toward. These meetings are quiet work, but they help hold everything else together.

Potter's House: Learning and Thriving



Across the Potter's House education programme, Treasures are being supported academically, emotionally and spiritually. Haslyn (8) joined in 2024 struggling with reading, writing and especially maths. With steady encouragement, she has made strong progress, with an average grade of 86 and a maths score of 89. Haslyn says, **"I am also grateful to the teachers... because they have supported me in my learning,"** and she loves the devotionals because she is learning about God's love.

Paula Sofia (12), pictured on the pull-out cover, has a similar story. She used to struggle with reading and multiplication, but now says she has improved in both, and she is thankful for **"the closeness I have been able to develop with God."**

Maydelin (14) describes how discipleship has helped shape her identity: **"I have really enjoyed discipleship... it has been very meaningful because I am learning to love myself as I am and as God created me."**



After years in the programme, Treasures like Melani are finishing well, graduating and stepping into the next chapter with skills, faith and hope. Brandon (18) has seen a similar turning point, moving from inconsistency and low motivation to steady attendance and an average grade of 95. Passing the year has opened the door for him to continue his education in person, a major step forward.
